The creatures can't speak freely. Everyone's constantly looking over their shoulders. Mr Tumnus is terrified just for having tea with Lucy. There's no peace.

Then comes the whisper: "Aslan is on the move." And suddenly things start to shift. The snow begins to melt. Father Christmas shows up, declaring that the Witch's power is crumbling.

That's what happens when the Prince of Peace arrives.

The peace of Advent isn't just about everything being calm. It's about restoration. Wholeness. Things becoming what they were meant to be.

Lewis calls it the "deep magic" - truth that runs deeper than the Witch could understand. When Aslan lays down his life on the Stone Table and rises again, he defeats death itself and establishes lasting peace.

Advent reminds us that we're living between the "already" and the "not yet."

Christ has come - the snow is melting, Christmas has broken into our winter. But we're still waiting for the full flowering of his kingdom.

Like the Narnians who trusted Aslan would return, we hold fast to the promise that our Prince of Peace reigns.

I wonder whether there are parts of your life where there is a lack of peace at the moment? Perhaps difficult or broken relationships. Tensions in the workplace. Neighbourly disputes.

What might it mean for the Prince of Peace to break through into those situations? Be encouraged by the reminder that Jesus reigns in those moments, and that today is not the end. Jesus is on the move!

#### **PRAYING WITH CHRISTMAS CARDS**

Thank you to Judith and Kelvin who have shared this great idea about how they use Christmas Cards to pray:

"As Christmas cards start arriving, we pray that we can enjoy receiving them and then lift a prayer for the sender that day.

Then, after Christmas, we keep them all in a box and at random pick one out each day to include the sender(s) in our prayers. We then stand the card where we can see if for the rest of the day.

As we have been away a lot this year, it took us till September to work our way through!

This idea can be used in many ways, you could just read the card, stand it somewhere that day and put up an "arrow prayer" or something a little more. It's really adaptable.

As we move into Advent and the pressures of commercialised Christmas, this is one way we can reset our thinking"
