

Making Space for Slow Wisdom

Last week I attended the annual Southern Counties Baptist Association leaders conference. While it may not rival Spring Harvest for inspiring worship or attract Billy Graham-esque crowds, it was nevertheless a useful couple of days to slow down and reflect.

The theme for the teaching sessions was 'discernment' - a thoroughly Baptist word - with four sessions shared between two speakers. The first, Ruth Moriarty, has recently published a book based on her doctoral research exploring the nature of discernment in Baptist Church Meetings.

She has coined the phrase *slow wisdom* to summarise the key takeaway from her findings. *Slow wisdom* is essentially the process of slowing down to take our time when an issue needs discernment, recognising that enabling greater input by members at Church Meetings brings not only a greater sense of shared ownership, but often uncovers deeper layers of wisdom which can be missed by quick decision-making.

The diaconate at NBC have already been engaging with this over the past year or so, and have committed to practicing this in our meetings together when we believe a matter requires careful discernment, rather than a quicker decision. We will also be practicing this in our own Church Meetings, beginning later this month.

Church Members will see from the agenda and accompanying papers that we will be having a discussion about developing our understanding of and participation in mission. This is a big issue and will require time, prayer, careful listening, and active engagement in order for us to draw conclusions which we can then put into practice. I encourage you to note the Church Meeting dates in your diary and make every effort to attend, especially if you don't normally come along.

I'm mindful of the fact that among our membership we have people from a range of denominational backgrounds, some of whom don't see the point in Church Meetings. Others have had bad experiences and vowed not to return. If that's you, then I can only say 'please give it a(nother) go'. As the body of Christ, we are richer for your presence and your input.

As Baptists, we reject the episcopacy practiced by other denominations. Instead, we recognise that while God does call some to be set aside for leadership roles, we uphold the priesthood of all believers (1 Peter 2:9). This means when the body of Christ gathers to listen to God (the Church Meeting), we expect God to speak through us, and for us to discern the mind of Christ. It is a lofty expectation, and perhaps one which Baptist churches have too often failed to live up to. With your participation and a healthy dose of *slow wisdom*, my hope is that our Church Meetings this year will be engaging, constructive, and most of all, a place where God speaks and we hear.
